Retiring Presidential Address – Dr Toner Stevenson

I acknowledge all First Nations Peoples, elders past present and emerging, and I respect their custodianship of country, never ceded. Aboriginal Peoples were the first watchers of the Southern Stars, Moon and planets from Australia and their knowledge of astronomy is enduring and relevant.

I am proud that we have made the most of these times and in the tradition of the past I have decided to re-instate the 2-year term for president. I have enjoyed and always felt privileged to be president of this small, but rich and vibrant society, and a change in leadership provides opportunity for renewal, growth and diversity and true leadership is about empowering others.

The reason our society was formed in 1895 was to bring like-minded people together to share and enhance knowledge about astronomy and, despite all, we have kept true to our origins. This time last year we had hopes that the pandemic would ease and that we could return, in 2021, to talks at Sydney Observatory and members viewing nights. This was not to be but I am thankful for the opportunities we had to observe the 26 May total Lunar Eclipse at Sydney Observatory and our end of year celebration at Centennial Park.

We had a very poignant meeting in February, inspired by Elizabeth Cocking's suggestion to ask Members for your views and interests. Your contributions shaped one of our most important achievements this year, the growth of membership reports. I want to thank the members including Monty Leventhal, Jonni Harrison, Craig McIlveen, Andrew Wood, George Mavrocordatos, Elizabeth Cocking, Mike Chapman and Ann Cairns who stepped up to present short talks and I will never forget Robert Luxford's fabulous Lunar Eclipse video. All who have attended our Zoom meets have contributed to our community of learning through your engagement with our speakers.

As I reflected on our program I realised that we have revelled in the opportunity to host speakers from Scotland, Tasmania, Western Australia as well as locally, to share diverse areas of astronomical research:

 Last October I presented my research about the women who measured the stars for the Astrographic Catalogue.

- In November Dr Lucyna Chudczer unlocked some of the mysteries of Jupiter through the Juno Mission. Jupiter continues to surprise us and was in the news recently re changes to the great Red spot turbulence.
- In March Dr Martin George from Launceston took us to Planetariums around the World explaining their importance in education, family participation, and enjoyment.
- In April Rami Mandow discussed his search for Planet Nine. He gave insights into research methods through the story of how pulsars were discovered.
- In May Dr Graziella Caprarelli asked us to consider the discovery of underground lakes on Mars and how this alters our understanding of that planet.
- The Astronomer Royal of Scotland, Professor Catherine Heyman joined us in June to explore the dark side of the Universe.
- July was Members' presentation night, a model we will repeat next year.
- Dr Ian Kemp spoke at the meeting in August about the Cataclysmic Variable Stars: Searching for ripples in the cosmic Niagara Falls.
- In September we heard theories about the discovery of the Moons reflected sunlight from Philosopher Professor Rick Benetiz, from the University of Sydney..

Our website has evolved and also become more inclusive with reports from Andrew Wood and Garry Dalrymple as well as the 24 posts by Elizabeth Cocking and Monty Leventhal's monthly solar observations. We capture data on our most popular blogposts and the extent of our website reaches across the globe. This month alone we had over 6,000 people engage with our website content.

Our social media presence continues to have impact thanks to Ann Cairns and Mike Chapman and all those who like, share and comment on the Sydney City Skywatchers Facebook page. The Sydney City Skywatchers Astronomers Bulletin is available on the website and editor Janette Brennan continues to make this valuable contribution with many articles contributed by members.

Before I relinquish this role, I want to thank the committee for their support:

- Secretary and Membership Manager, Elizabeth Cocking for her dedicated enthusiasm, great ideas and administration. Elizabeth was awarded Life Membership in December last year.
- Vice president Ann Cairns, and committee member George Mavrocordatos, thank you for your dedication for the historic telescope collection and organisation of outreach activities.
- Vice president Dr Andrew Jacob, has generously contributed expertise and is our strong connection with the Museum of Applied Arts and Sciences
- Prabina Lord- Doyle supported our mission through her work on our image and more.
- Monty Leventhal OAM brings his wisdom and experience to our decision-making. I want to congratulate Monty for his success in the Harold Ridley Grant from the BAA.
